

The Adelaide City Council has tried to hide this story until after the Council election in November.

However the cat is out of the bag, and APPA will make this an election issue for all Council candidates.

There is a secret report that recommends building a multi-million dollar commercial function centre on <u>Possum Park / Pirltawardli (Park 1)</u> and turning over most of the Park to commercial operators to make a profit from the North Adelaide Golf Courses.

The report is confidential, although members of the outgoing City Council have been briefed on it and sworn to secrecy.

The Advertiser reports (\$) that a "masterplan" for Park 1 has been completed by consultants GHD Woodheads for the Adelaide Clty Council.

In a City Council meeting last month, Councillor Philip Martin urged that the report be made public before the election. However, his effort did not succeed and the report is still under wraps.

You will have a chance to question Council election candidates about their attitudes to this (and other issues) in a public forum next month. See the 'election forum' story below.



A pattern has emerged in the way that the Adelaide City Council deals with sporting groups who want their buildings on the Park Lands.

Leaders of a sporting group or school community typically spend months, if not years, cultivating a relationship with Council contacts, repeatedly emphasising how much their members and supporters would appreciate a favourable decision.

By the time a sporting group's request formally comes before a Council meeting, its wishes have been firmly implanted in most Councillors minds. Eventually, the public is asked for comment. However, by the time the public has been alerted, the sporting group has already achieved its aim of convincing Council staff and a majority of councillors. At that stage, the belated arrival of dozens of public submissions rarely stands a chance of affecting the outcome of months of earlier insistent lobbying that public Park Lands ought to be handed over.



It's one thing to request change rooms, showers and toilets to facilitate sports. APPA has no concerns about these type of installations because they are reasonably necessary to play sport and can be shared by all potential users of sporting fields.

This example in <u>Victoria Park / Pakapakanthi (Park</u> <u>16)</u> shows how modestly-sized change rooms, shower and toilets can be for public benefit.

Its quite another thing when sporting groups try to get approval to have their own private, locked meeting rooms, offices, function rooms, gyms, catering spaces, administration, private storage facilities or even classrooms on the Park Lands.

The Council has consistently failed to push back on demands by sporting clubs for excessive Park Lands floor space. Time after time, both the Park Lands Authority and the Council have simply rolled over in eagerness to please each sporting group. In every case the public loses another slab of Park Lands to private interests.

There are many examples over the past four years and currently being planned, with the approval of the current City Council:




The trend of allowing multiple function centres and meeting rooms on Park Lands is shaping up as one of the key issues in this year's City Council elections.

The State Government is taking Park Lands advice from a real estate developer and those who have taken Park Lands away, as it seeks new ways to privatise or exploit the Park Lands commercially..

Stephan Knoll is both Planning Minister and also Minister for the Adelaide Park Lands Act. He's set up a new Riverbank Entertainment Precinct Advisory Committee (REPAC). As its name suggests, this Committee will advise Minister Knoll on what to do with the land near the River Torrens - predominantly in central Tarntanya Wama (Park 26).

Very little of Tarntanya Wama (Park 26) remains as Park Lands after decades of attacks by successive Governments, alienating land for commercial, private uses. (See the pic). Now, it appears, this Park has not been disappearing fast enough for the newly-installed State Government.

REPAC includes a representative each from the institutions which have taken over most of Park 26: SkyCity Casino, the InterContinental Hotel, Adelaide Convention Centre, Adelaide Festival Centre, and the Adelaide Oval Stadium Management Authority, as well as a representative each from the Adelaide City Council and Renewal SA.

REPAC's chair is Roger Cook AM, one of the founders of the Australian commercial real estate giant Colliers International. Mr Cook has a long history in the development and real estate industries.







International 'Park of the Year'.

It is unfortunate that Adelaide does not strut the world stage to brag about our Park Lands. After all, we have the first and only! (If you don't know what the means, see our web site home page). Awards for Park of the Year will be handed out at the International Parks and Leisure Congress, in Melbourne, October 14-17 but the Adelaide Park Lands haven't been nominated. Why not, Adelaide City Council?

Heritage assessment drags on.

After more than a year spent evaluating 1,747 public submissions, the State Heritage branch is still preparing a paper for the Heritage Council on mechanisms for protecting Adelaide Park Lands, if the Heritage Council determines it to be of State heritage significance. For that purpose it is consulting with DPTI and the City of Adelaide about these mechanisms. Later, formal about those mechanisms. Later, formal consultation will occur with the Kaurna community and with APPA. Accordingly, no decision on interim listing of the Park Lands is expected until 2019.





Whitmore Square / Iparrityi

The City Council's Master Plan for Whitmore Square / Iparrityi is nearly finalised and will be presented to the Adelaide Park Lands Authority in late September, followed by Council. This financial year, Council has allocated \$200,000 towards small-scale improvements to Whitmore Square to support the Master Plan. Emerging community priorities are lighting and enhancing the green spaces of the square



Hopes raised for freeing Victoria Park. South Australia's new motor racing venue, The Bend at Tailem Bend hosted its first major event late in August. The program of races over three days was well received by motor racing fans. The apparent success of the venue has raised hopes that The Bend could take over the role of hosting the Adelaide 500 after the current arrangements using the eastern Park Lands expire in March 2021.
