12. PEST BEETLE THREATENS ELM TREES

The City of Adelaide is confident that the 140-year "carriageway" of elm trees in your Carriageway Park / Tuthangga (Park 17) are not at imminent risk from a destructive beetle pest.

Some parts of SA risk losing their historic elms, but the City of Adelaide tells us "we are not seeing more attacks than in previous years".

A City spokesperson says "left untreated, trees do suffer as a consequence of beetle attacks. It is important to note we have pest control programs in place and treat trees where the beetles are a problem and that includes the significant Elm carriageway."
